- 9. We Were Liars by E Lockhart (mystery/realistic fiction)
- 10. Everything, Everything by Nicola Yoon (realistic fiction)
- 11. The Hunger Games by Suzanne Collins (science fiction)
- 12. Born a Crime by Trevor Noah (memoir)
- 13. Any of Alan Gratz's books (historical fiction)
